Open Knowledge Foundation – delodi

In this group we explore to what extent open data is available on case studies of migration streams. How can we use visualization tools to tell stories around movement and migration in and out of Europe and the European Union. We have prepared a case study around Belgrade, a city in Europe but outside of the EU. On the day itself there is room to adapt to the needs of the participants and explore other cases as well.
